




Welcome Bishop Brian Thom!


Decorating Team

The Nicene Creed (continued from last month's newsletter) By Tom Tudor

There were seven Ecumenical Councils. These seven councils are recognized as Ecumenical Councils because they were called by an appropriate authority representative of the whole Roman Empire, and were wholly accepted by the Eastern and Western branches of the Church.

Last month's article set out a brief statement of the orthodox doctrine of the Trinity---of the relation of God the Father, God the Son, and God and the Son and the Holy Spirit. This was set out in the Nicene Creed, first formulated and adopted at the First Council of Nicea (325) and again, in the form we know today, at the First Council of Constantinople (381).

One of the purposes of this article is to illustrate that doctrines of the Christian Church were not readily formulated and agreed to when Christianity was first established as a "Church". The Church's history is filled with many hotly contested disputes and controversies. I do not pretend to be familiar with more than a small part of this history. It is, however, a story that is fascinating to study and explore. The following is one example of the complexity of this story.

The Nicene Creed declared that Jesus is truly God and truly Man. A widespread reaction concerning this doctrine and its vocabulary had developed following 325 and 350.

The Nicene Creed, adopted at the First Council of Constantinople, had declared that Jesus is truly God and truly Man.

Following the First Council of Nicea and the First Council of Constantinople were the Council of Ephesus (431) and the Council of Chalcedon (451). The Bishops in attendance at these councils looked at the doctrine of the Person of Christ, the actual identity of Jesus Christ. In brief, the question to be addressed at these councils was whether Jesus is two persons joined together with one nature or one Person with two natures.

Nestorius, the Bishop of Constantinople, was said to teach that within Christ there are not only two different natures, but also two different persons, and that Mary gave birth to the human person with a human nature. Cyril, the Bishop of Alexandria, believed that there is one and one only Person, the Lord Jesus Christ, and that the Son of Mary is the Son of God with his human nature.

Nestorius' teachings had been condemned at a Council in Rome in 430. At the Council of Ephseus in 431, which Nestorius asked the Emperor Theodosius II to convene to establish his orthodoxy, the council condemned his teachings, known as Nestorianism. as heretical. The Council of Chalcedon in 451 again condemned his teachings. The council declared that Mary did not give birth merely to a man with a human nature, but that her Son is the eternal Son of the Father, who took His human nature and flesh in her womb, that she truly is the "God-bearing" Virgin, the Mother of God.

The Council of Chalcedon issued a formulation of the union of the two natures of Christ, one human and one divine, "united with neither confusion nor division". Most of the major branches of Western Christianity and Eastern Orthodoxy subscribe to this formulation, while many branches of Oriental Orthodox Church reject it, subscribing to the doctrine that there is only one nature.

The Book of Common Prayer (BCP) contains this definition in the section of the BCP containing Historical Documents of the Church, on page 864, which reads, in part:

Council of Chalcedon, 451 AD

Therefore, following the holy fathers, we all with one accord teach men to acknowledge one and the same Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, at once complete in Godhead and complete in manhood, truly God and truly man, consisting also of a reasonable soul and body, of one substance (homoousios) with the Father as regards his Godhead, and at the same time of one substance with us as regards his manhood...the distinction of natures being in no way annulled by the union, but rather the characteristic of each nature being preserved and coming together to form one person and subsistence, not as parted or separated into two persons, but one and the same Son and Only-begotten God the Word, Lord Jesus

Christ....
