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#### WHAT'S THE PURPOSE?

The season of Lent doesn't have a very positive image. We associate it with penitence, feeling guilty, and depriving ourselves of something we like. But what purpose does that serve? Discipline can be a positive thing in our lives, but what is accomplished by giving up a little treat like chocolate for six weeks knowing that we can start eating it again immediately after? What does that accomplish? I've known friends to give up desserts for Lent in hopes of losing a few pounds. I don't think that was what God really cares about.

Originally, the purpose of giving something up for Lent was to allow us more time and energy to do something else, something more positive like prayer or service or helping others or developing a new, better habit. The aim was personal growth.

But to really understand Lent, we need to know how it got started.

In the early church, people became members through adult baptism. Lent was set aside as a time to specifically prepare the new converts to be baptized. Easter morning was the great celebration of resurrection and of baptism. As the dawn came up on Easter, the new Christians went into the water and came out as new members of the church.

The forty days of Lent were spent teaching the basics of the faith to the new believers. It was much like the confirmation classes we offer in the modern church. They learned about the Bible stories, the 10 Commandments, the Lord's Prayer, the creed, and of course the sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion. They were asked to set aside other things that would distract them from focusing on their faith. It was a time of discovery and growth.




I'd encourage you to reframe this Lent in these terms. How could you use these forty days in a positive sense? What is some small but significant way you would like to grow your faith? God doesn't need grumpy, self-deprived people. God wants us to be alive and growing as believers. Have a blessed Lent!

#### **Update from Search Committee**


Greetings from the search committee. While we have had some great interest and application for the open rector position, the search committee decided that allowing the position to accept additional applications until the end of February would be in the best interest of our parish. Rev. Steve Godfrey met with other transition ministers from the heartland of the US in December. There were about 50 openings and 4 priests looking for a new position. Rev Godfrey has assured us that is not uncommon. In addition, right after our closing date for applications, seminarians were taking their examinations. This may have not been on the radar for those graduating from seminary due to the timing with their exams and the end of the year. Pastor Steve Sathre has agreed to continue for a little longer than planned initially so there will be no gap with allowing the search to proceed for a little longer.

#### The Apostle Paul


Paul was born in Tarsus, a city located about 12 miles inland from the Mediterranean Sea in present-day Turkey. The exact date of his birth is not known, but it would have been in the early first century CE. He was probably about ten years younger than Jesus. He was a Roman citizen by birth (his father was a Roman citizen). He was a Jew, studied Jewish theology in the synagogue at Tarsus and in Jerusalem. He became a Pharisee, an ancient Jewish sect distinguished by strict observance of the traditional and written Jewish law. He became a persecutor of what was then the Christian faith. However, his time as a persecutor was brief.

Paul became a follower of Christ after his encounter with Jesus on the road to Damascus. (The story of Paul's vision and conversion is set out in chapter 9 in the Book of Acts.)

Paul is known as the apostle to the Gentiles. He began his missionary journey and to preach and write his letters about twenty years after Jesus' death. Paul is often considered to be the most important person after Jesus in the history of Christianity.

Paul's letters are "first hand" and are the earliest Christion documents known at present. He believed that he was the Messianic envoy to the Gentiles, preparing the way for the return of the son of man from heaven to raise the dead and establish his terrestrial kingdom.

Paul did not write all the letters attributed to him in the New Testament. Only seven are believed to have been written by Paul. These letters portray a Paul quite different from the Paul of the other letters, known as the Deutero-Pauline letters.



The letters, in chronological order, are 1 and 2 Thessalonians, Galatians, 1 and 2 Corinthians, Romans (the longest letter), Philippians (the shortest letter), Philemon, Colossians, Ephesians, Titus, and 1 and 2 Timothy,

In the course of his mission, Paul made four journeys to the countries bordering the Mediterranean Sea, traveling from Asia Minor in the west to as far east as Spain. Paul's letters may be divided into two groups, those written during his activities as a Messianic envoy and those written while he was a prisoner at Rome.

Paul was under "house arrest" during his first journey to Rome, about 62-64 CE. He was free to travel for a time, but upon his return to Rome he was imprisoned for a second time and, during the persecutions of Nero, died a martyr's death in 67 CE.
