The relationship between religion and politics has always been a delicate balancing act and subject to constant abuse. I have to admit that I am on the side of keeping them as separate as possible. The power of religion lies in its ability to stand outside of politics and call the government to account. No, I am privileged and responsible for enjoying and caring for this whole world and all its children.



Financial Update

Thank you to St. George's for your weekly plate offerings and for keeping up with your pledges! The Vestry continues to receive monthly reports on our finances. By the end of March, we received about 11% of our budgeted income and spent about 12% of our budgeted expenses, so we are keeping up reasonably well. We will increasingly draw on our investments as we realize ongoing expenses for water incursion mitigation, and as our new Administrative Assistant (Alekz Thoms) and new Educational Activities Coordinator (Karan Krom) come on board. Estimates of these expenses and funding sources are all included in the budget previously approved for this year, though the water mitigation costs are likely to be higher than we hoped. Thank you again for remembering St. George's in your giving.

The Pascal Candle

This Paschal candle is one of the most sacred and enduring elements in Christianity. Made of beeswax to represent the purity of Christ, the candle's wick signifies Christ's humanity, and the flame His Divine Nature. It is adorned with one or more Christian symbols, often the cross to represent His redemptive sacrifice; the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet - Alpha and Omega - to signify that He is the beginning and the end; symbols of wheat and grapes, or a chalice and host, for the Eucharist - the true presence of Christ and our spiritual strength; the 12 Apostles - witnesses and scribes to the passion, death, resurrection and ascension of Christ;

and other symbols such as the Good Shepherd, the Lamb, the Sacred Heart, and

the Risen Christ.

The Paschal candle is a rich symbol of our faith. It reaches its pinnacle at Easter. Each year during the Easter Vigil service on Holy Saturday night, a fire is kindled in a metal bowl, called a brazier (bray'-zhur). From the brazier comes a "new" and blessed fire that lights the Paschal candle which is carried in procession into the dark church. The "new" fire serves as an image of the Resurrection. The candle, which represents Christ himself, is placed on a special Paschal candle stand near the altar. Five grains of incense are inserted into the candle to recall the aromatic spices that were used to prepare Christ's body for the tomb, and the wounds in His hands, feet and side, which remained after His resurrection.

The Paschal candle remains in the Sanctuary on its special candle stand during the full 50 days of the Easter season, and is lit for liturgical services during that time. After Pentecost, the candle will be placed next to the baptismal font. The candle is lit during all baptisms throughout the year, passing the light of Christ to each person baptized, starting with the Catechumens at the Easter Vigil service. The candle may also be used at funeral services, and placed next to the casket during a funeral Mass. At funeral services, it is a reminder that the sacrament of Baptism is itself a death and resurrection in Christ, and testifies to Christian certainty in the resurrection of the dead and life with Christ in the world to some

Old North Church

Christ Church, in the City of Boston, was, before the Revolutionary War, an Anglican church located in the North End neighborhood of Boston. Christ Church is more familiar to us as the "Old North Church."

Old North Church is famous for its role in Paul Revere's midnight ride on April 18, 1775. On that night, two lanterns were hung in the church's steeple, which alerted Revere, then in a rowboat crossing the Charles River, and others to British military movements which led to the battles of Lexington and Concord, the first engagements of the American Revolutionary War.

The City of Boston was virtually an island at that time, connected to the mainland on its south by a narrow road known as the Boston Neck. The Charles River enters the Back Bay of Boston from the west, and the Mystic River enters the Back Bay from the north. To the east of the city is Boston Harbor.

Construction of Christ Church began in 1723, and continued for 22 years. Its steeple was added 17 year after the commencement of construction, and has been toppled twice by hurricanes, rebuilt and replaced both times. Christ Church is the oldest standing church building in Boston and is a National Historic Landmark.

Christ Church closed during the Revolutionary War because its congregation included both Patriots and Tories. The Rector, a Tory, was banished to Canada. The Church reopened after the war as a member of the newly organized Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States.
