### SUMMER IN THE HILLS

For the past several summers it has been my privilege to be a visiting pastor at the Chapel in the Hills in Rapid City, SD. The chapel itself is a wooden, Norwegian style church (like the one in the Heritage Park in Minot) and is in a beautiful green wooded setting. There is a little cabin on the grounds and pastors can stay there free for a week if they preside at the evening vesper services in the chapel and any weddings that are scheduled. The rest of the time I have free and I plan to ride my motorcycle through the hills.

The weddings are always a surprise. I first meet with the wedding party half and hour before the actual ceremony and I never know who is going to show up. One wedding party came in full Western gear. The men wore black jeans with the big silver belt buckles, cowboy shirts with bandanas around their necks, and ten gallon hats on their heads. The women all had cowboy boots under their fancy dresses.

Another wedding was all bikers. They rode up to the chapel on their bikes and wore their leather chaps and black t-shirts. I surprised them by wearing my black leather vest over my clergy shirt for the ceremony.

And then there was the Scottish wedding! All the guys wore kilts, the women wore tartan shawls, and a bagpiper led the music. You never know what you will see.

The evening vesper services are very special. It is usually only a small group gathered – 10-15 people. They are tourists from all over America who stop to pray in the midst of their travels. After worship some may ask for special prayers for challenges in their lives. It is a special privilege to do so.

This June I will return for another week at the chapel. It's a time of rest and renewal but I love that there will be intentional times to be in touch with God and God's people. Those chance encounters with others during weddings and vesper services always give me glimpses of God's presence in the world.

As you have time for rest and travel this summer, my prayer is that God will go with you and bless you with surprise glimpses of God's presence anywhere and everywhere in God's great world.

# Ben & Chuck Suchy



# Learning to Walk in the Dark

The next book for St. George's book discussion is Learning to Walk in the Dark, by Barbara Brown Taylor. The group will meet on Monday, June 17<sup>th</sup> at 4 pm at St. George's. We will discuss the entire book at this meeting. All are invited to participate!



Taylor has become increasingly uncomfortable with our tendency to associate all that is good with lightness and all that is evil and dangerous with darkness. Doesn't God work in the nighttime as well? In *Learning to Walk in the Dark*, Taylor asks us to put aside our fears and anxieties and to explore all that God has to teach us "in the dark". She argues that we need to move away from our "solar spirituality" and ease our way into appreciating "lunar spirituality" (since, like the moon, our experience of the light waxes and wanes). Through darkness we find courage, we understand the world in new ways, and we feel God's presence around us, guiding us through things seen and unseen. Often, it is while we are in the dark that we grow the most.

With her characteristic charm and literary wisdom, Taylor is our guide through a spirituality of the nighttime, teaching us how to find our footing in times of uncertainty and giving us strength and hope to face all of life's challenging moments.


But not everyone carries cash or writes checks like they used to. Many of our parishioners contribute by giving online or by writing a smaller number of larger checks throughout the year.

Recycling has been on my radar for years, but I had the excuse that in our rural area recycle pick up was not available. So even though I felt pangs of guilt each time I threw away a plastic laundry jug, water

bottle, or cardboard box, I didn't change my behavior. Until I heard that the Bismarck city landfill was being filled much faster than anticipated in the long-term plan. I recently spoke about that in a sermon. Now I had to change my ways.

We went to Walmart and bought a small container to hold recycling in the kitchen. We repurposed a larger garbage container in our garage for recyclables. Step one completed. I learned that the City of Bismarck landfill has recycling drop off containers just before you reach the weight scale. It is free of charge! About every two weeks, I take a drive and empty my large black garbage bag of recyclables at the city landfill recycle site. Step two completed. Our weekly garbage was cut in half. It really was relatively easy once we decided to simply begin.
